- ✓ Avoid entering or leaving the room during a performance. If absolutely necessary, move only between selections.
- ✓ Talking should be avoided during a performance.
- ✓ Pagers, cellular phones, and alarms should be set on silent.
- \checkmark Unhappy children should be taken outside the performance area immediately.
- ✓ Refrain from flash photography while groups are performing.
